Fast Facts: Fall 2017

50	The number of beautiful bales of hay donated to the CWHF farm in September by Mary Dahling of J&M Arabians and Old Dominion Hay from Smithfield, Virginia. This generous gift will last our rescued mustangs through the fall!
73	We did an aerial survey of the horses' habitat in August and counted 73 horses. Tree cover was thick so it was difficult to see every single horse. Based on field observations and this number we are confident there are close to around 100 horses in the herd. We have started doing these aerial surveys six times per year.

3	The number of foals born to the herd this past year. Mateo came along in April, Eclipse was born in July, and we spotted another foal (sex undetermined) from the helicopter in August.
